Sydney Study Tour

(12 - 19 April 2025)

Thirty S3 to S5 students, accompanied by Mr. LEE Ka-ki, Ms. CHAN Yuen-shan, and Ms. WONG Lai-chun, embarked on an enriching study tour to Sydney, Australia, from 12 April 2025 (Saturday) to 19 April 2025 (Saturday). During this seven-day immersive experience, students gained first-hand insights into Sydney's history, culture, and environmental conservation efforts.

Exploring Sydney's Iconic Landmarks

On 13 April 2025 (Sunday), students began their exploration at the Sydney Opera House, a masterpiece of modern architecture. A tour guide was arranged to show them around, introducing its history and sustainable design principles, such as energy efficiency and material innovation, which align with global environmental goals. Moreover, students gained a deeper understanding of the Sydney Harbour Bridge while admiring panoramic views of the city. This experience highlighted the importance of engineering and sustainable city design. In the afternoon, students visited Hyde Park to study native Australian flora and fauna, deepening their understanding of ecological balance. The visit to the Royal Botanic Garden Sydney further reinforced lessons on biodiversity conservation, where they observed how plant species adapt to urban environments.

Cultural and Historical Immersion

In The Rocks, Sydney's historic district, students explored colonial-era architecture and learned about Australia's multicultural heritage. At Darling Harbour, they examined the history of maritime trade and its economic impact on Australia. A visit to the Sydney Maritime Museum provided insights into ocean conservation and the historical significance of maritime exploration, linking past discoveries to modern environmental challenges.

Environmental and Wildlife Conservation

Students visited Taronga Zoo, which is located on the shores of Sydney Harbour. It is one of Australia's premier wildlife conservation institutions. It allowed students to see animals from around the globe. Students also visited Blue Mountains National Park. The Scenic Skyway offered a thrilling gondola ride 270 meters above the Blue Mountains, which provided a stunning 360-degree view. Led by the local tour guide, students explored the Scenic Walkway. They strolled along the hiking track and got up close with some of the region's most beloved plants and animals. Each track had different information signs that displayed the history of the Blue Mountains.

Art, Culture and Academic Exchange

The Museum of Contemporary Art exposed students to Indigenous Australian art and contemporary works. Students were encouraged to reflect on cultural identity and environmental themes in art. Afterwards, they took part in a workshop with a local artist in which they created their own masterpieces by sketching the natural scenery near the art museum. A highlight of the study tour was the visit to the University of Sydney, where students interacted with local students. The experience provided them with information of higher education opportunities in Australia.
